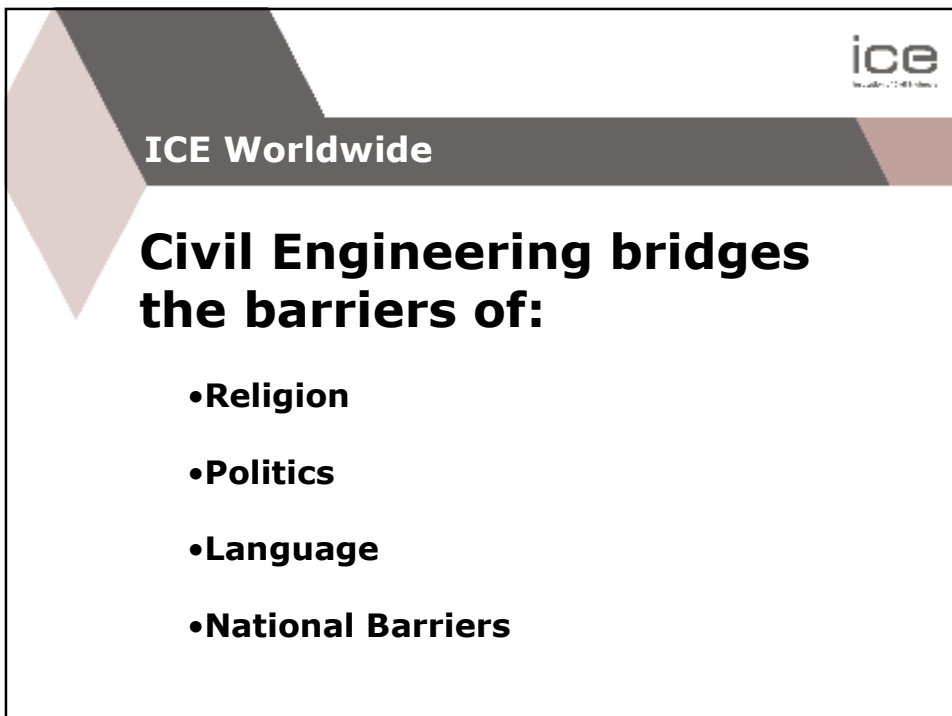

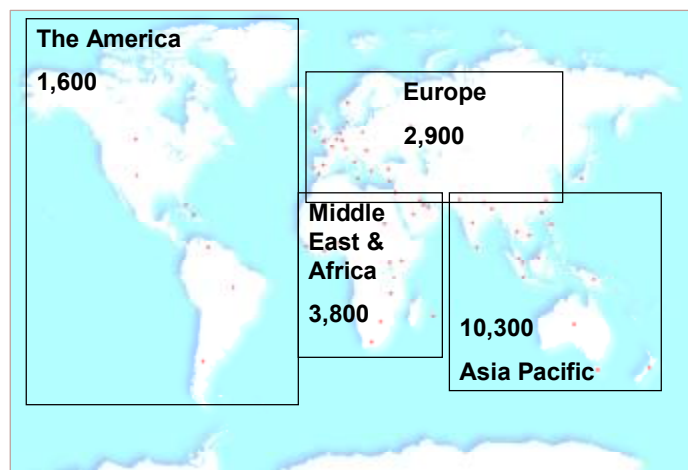

Directive 2005/36/EC

- The profession of civil engineer is not regulated in the UK.
Registration/Membership with ICE is therefore not necessary in order to work in the UK.
- The protected titles of CEng MICE, IEng MICE and EngTech TMICE are regulated under the Directive.

ICE believes:

- Mutual recognition of qualifications (subject to verification of standards) is important
- National protectionism damages the profession and limits innovation
